Grading Guidelines

Flour Bluff High School operates on a seven (7) period schedule. The school year is divided into two semesters with three six-week grading periods per semester. A student may be exempt from a semester exam if attendance and grade guidelines are met. Course offerings include: special education, honor/gifted-talented, advanced placement, career/technology, and distance learning courses. Students may also take dual credit courses for high school and college credit. Advanced placement exams are also available.

Flour Bluff High School is on a 100 scale. A student's cumulative Grade Point Average (GPA) is figured by averaging each semester's grades. Advanced Placement, Pre Advanced Placement, and Advanced classes are given an additional 10 points when calculating the GPA. Advanced classes shall refer to those courses designated as Advanced by the board of trustees and listed annually in the District Career Planning Guide. The semester values are then averaged together to calculate the cumulative GPA. Independent projects completed through the morning Independent Studies Program will add additional weight to the cumulative GPA for students entering 9th grade in 2002-2003 or earlier. Rank is based on the weighted cumulative GPA and no two students hold the same rank.

All state approved courses taken, whether repeated or not, are figured in the GPA. High school courses taken in junior high shall be calculated into the student's high school grade point average. Courses designated as local shall not be entered in the ranking system. Grades from non-accredited non-public schools, including homeschools, shall not be used in determining class rank, grade point average, or academic average.
